M s. Casado from the Foundation Center called me on March 1st and asked for my permission to call my references. I told her to feel free to call my references. She called me back on Monday, March 5th to offer me the web internship position.

Today was the first day of my internship in the Foundation Center, I felt really excited. I arrived 10 minutes earlier at 8:50am. Ms. Casado gave me some forms to fill out and gave me a tour of the company afterward. The Foundation Center had three floors, 2nd, 3rd and 4th floor of the building. I worked in the web development department on the 3rd floor.

I met with Mary Ann Santos, the web design manager and my supervisor, after the tour. Ms. Santos introduced me to the director of the web design department and her team members. She started to give me some simple web assignments to do. I had to update some information of their website with my knowledge of html and css. I had my lunch break from 12:30pm to 1:30pm. After I came back from lunch, Ms. Santos gave me a little more advanced assignment to work on. I had to update a page of their website by putting some old reports as archive and adding new report to the page. It was confusing in the beginning because my team worked on more than five websites and there are thousands of folders in the root folder. I made some minor mistakes that Ms. Santos pointed out and I fixed it after.

Ms. Santos was satisfied with my performance on the first day of my internship and let me leave an hour earlier. I like this web internship so far. I hope I can learn as much as I can.

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oday was the second day of my internship. I worked from 10 am to 5pm and had an hour lunch break.

Ms. Santos gave me some projects to do as usual. The project was pretty straightforward. I had to update some information of some pages of the website. Ms. Santos printed out the pages and marked down what I needed to change. I deleted some old content and added some new content on some pages using Dreamweaver. Every time I finished the project that Ms. Santos assigned, I had to let her know, so she could check if I did everything right.

I had a chance to work on a newsletter today as well. It was similar to what I did earlier; I just had to update the content.

That's what I did today and I enjoyed it.

This afternoon, Daniel Matz, a web services associate gave me another project to do. The project that he gave me was a little bit different, yet it was kind of similar to some projects I did before. I had to add all the information of a new report online. I learned something new by doing this project today. Mr. Matz taught me that I could type in the code on Microsoft Excel and pasted it into Dreamweaver after. I created 10 html pages for the new report and had to add a link of the new report on all the other pages of the old reports. I did that manually. Mr. Matz taught me that I could have done that all at once by using a "Find and Replace" skill in Dreamweaver. He showed me the skill by adding a drop down menu of the new report. It was amazing and saved me a lot of work.

Mr. Matz was happy about my performance because I finished the project quickly. I was happy that I learned something new today.

> A s usual, I worked on a newsletter today. Every Tuesday, Ms. Santos needs me to help her update the information on one or two newsletters. I am used to it already. Updating the newsletter doesn't require that much knowledge of html and CSS. As long as you understanding the code, you can finish the newsletter easily.

> After lunch, I worked on an existing website that was for the Squire Family Foundation. The whole website was table based. I also added a toggle function to the left and right sidebars that allowed visitors to hide and show the content. Mr. Matz liked it a lot.





I searched the problem online and found out that was a common problem. I added "<div align="center"></div>" to wrap around the page and it worked on all browsers. I was happy that I accomplished the goal.

In the end, I worked on the Camp-Younts Foundation website. I just had to copy and paste the information from a word document to an html page. It was simple and I finished it guickly. I was done for the day after this project.

Dr. Pollard examined a S-year-old child with extreme nearsightedness. When the child was fitted with glasses for the first time, he looked at the doctor and smiled. Then he looked at his mother and gave her a big smile. His mother cried with emotion as she realized that her child was able to see dearly for the first time.

Twins open their eyes at last!

NEWS & HIGHLIGHTS

Dr. Pollard operated on twin girls born with severe ptosis (droopy eyelids) Dr. Pollard operated on twm girls born with severe ptosis (droopy eyelids) resulting in a sitelike opening of only 1-2 mm. Their parents had never been able to see their daughters' eyes opened normally. After surgery on both girls, their eyelids are fully open, and they no longer have to tilt back their heads in order to see.

A chemical injury is treated successfully!

A 3-year-old boy accidentally sprayed both eyes with a deaning solution. The chemical caused severe corneal abrasions. After the doctor irrigated the child's eyes with normal saline to neutralize the chemical, he recov-ered completely.

Severe headaches are resolved!

A 12-year-old boy with leukemia and thrombosis of several large veins in $\sim_{A,E+Qeer-out}$ uoy with leavemia and thrombosis of several large veins in his brain compliand of recurrent headarbes. Initially, a spinal tags indicated that his intracranial pressures were normal. The headarbes per-sisted. On a subsequent wits, our ophthalmologist diagnosed swellen optic nerves. He was referred to a neu-rosurgeon for surgery. His headarbes were alleviated.

Diagnostic expertise makes a difference!

A 4-year-old child who had a corneal transplant performed elsewhere presented with orbital cellulitis. She was unable to open her left eye, indicating a condition called endopithalmitis. After an intravitreal injection with antibiotics, her condition was resolved.

A traumatic injury is repaired!

A teenage boy presented with a ruptured globe and a traumatic cataract resulting from an eye injury caused by a stick. His ruptured globe was repaired, followed by cataract surgery with lens implant. As he healed from surgery, his visual aculty improved dramatically.



ESSAY 1 February 13, 2012



The main point of the article that is written by David Carr is clearly stated in the title: "Jobs saw what others missed". Mr. Jobs always created something new in the media business in the past, and everyone followed what he did.

Apple first required publishers to put their transactions through Apple, and took a third of the revenues. Even so, publishers couldn't get any consumer data selling their books from the iBookstore. There are currently 700,000 books available on the iBookstore.

When the music industry was facing the problem of piracy in 2001, Mr. Jobs didn't worried about it. He created a great strategy -- selling individual songs for only 99 cents. 10 billion songs were downloaded. "It's not the consumer's job to know what they want," Mr. Jobs said. He created the business of selling individual songs rather than a whole album. He let buyers to create their own playlists while paying a small price.

The writer, David Carr, stated that Mr. Jobs didn't do market research at all. "He did things his own way and expected the rest of the world to fall into line," Mr. Carr said. Steve Jobs was a top leader in the media business. He annihilated the floppy disk when the first iMac was made. Everybody thought that he was insane at that time. But 10 years later, everybody is using USB, and it seems like nobody remembers floppy disk's existence.

Article: Why some countries go bust Author: Adam Davidson

he author, Adam Davidson, starts off his article, "Why Some Countries Go Bust," by introducing Daron Acemoglu who is a Turkish M.I.T. professor of economics and the author of the new book, "Why Nations Fail." This article discusses about different reasons that economists suggest can cause some countries to be wealthier than others.


Adam Smith believed that the relative freedom of the markets played an important role to determine if a country was wealthy or not. Thomas Malthus asserted that poverty came from overpopulation. John Maynard Keynes claimed that lacking of technocrats caused poverty; while Jeffrey Sachs claimed that poor geographic conditions caused poverty. Acemoglu and James Robinson believed that the degree to which the average person shares in the overall growth of its economy determine the wealth of a country. It is similar to Smith's reason.

I agree with all the economists' assertions. To me, all the reasons that they proposed make sense at some point. One of the examples that Davidson gave proves Smith's and Acemoglu's assertions are right. Everyone in a group of Haitian mango farmers planted only one or two mango trees while they could have planted a few hundred more. Even though there were enough land for them to plant more mango trees, they only planted two because nobody had a clear title to the land. They didn't want the extra mangoes to be taken away by somebody who suddenly claimed to own the land. They lacked any incentive to plant more trees because they couldn't profit

n the article, Innovation Gurus: Bruce Mau & John Kao, Joe Robinson talked about how to be creative and how important creativity is.

Bruce Mau is one of the world's most famous designers and his client list is very broad. He was hired by the president of Arizona State University to redesign higher education. His firm designed Canada's largest bookstore, the décor of the New Meadowlands Stadium in New Jersev and so on. Mau said it's not that some people have creativity and some don't, having creativity is all about working hard. He tested 5,000 typefaces when he was hired by architect Frank Gehry to design the signage for the Walt Disney Concert Hall in Los Angeles. His team finally came up with a new font by combining two typefaces after hard work. He thought that entrepreneurs didn't spend enough time on the crafting, thinking and vetting process. Mau claimed that they had to look at the market and the product at the same time and most importantly, they had to know the customer's mind.

Bruce Mau wrote, "The Incomplete Manifesto for Growth," in 1998. He stated 43 points of strategy in design process. The point that impressed me the most is: Think with your mind. He told us to forget technology because creativity is not device-dependent. Most of the time, when I start a new design project, I will go online and look for some references to get some ideas. I think that it's good to listen to Mau's advice to not depend on technology. All the designs online are actually created by other people. I guess thinking in my mind can only create something new that no one has ever done before.

Another guru, John Kao, who is a jazz pianist, says that being playful is the source of new ideas. He claims that entrepreneurs can learn a lot about the creative process by listening to jazz music. He compares doing business with making music, they both need freedom to explore new things. Research finds that we are more creative when we are driven by the enjoyment or challenge of the experiences itself because we won't be afraid of failure.

attended the Meet the Pros on April 5th and the special guest speaker was Ron Berger who has made a lot of great campaigns. He shared his own story about how at first he started to work in the advertising industry by working as a summer mail boy in an advertising company at first.

The most famous campaign that he created was the "Time to make the Donuts," campaign in 1982 for Dunkin Donuts. It was selected by the Museum of Broadcasting as one of the best campaigns of the 1980's. As Berger mentioned, the selling point of the campaign was the freshness of donuts. The employees struggled to get up every morning at 3am to make donuts in order to prepare enough fresh donuts for consumers. Berger said that the strategy to make a successful commercial was being able to identify the truth of the product and make it resonate in consumers' minds. Most of us struggle to wake up every morning to go to school or work, so we know how the employees in the commercial feel. But they still got up that early to make fresh donuts everyday.

The best commercial that Berger thought he had ever created was "Survivors," for Volvo. The commercial didn't show any cars at all; instead, different people said how thankful they were that the cars saved their lives. Berger said that a good commercial didn't have to show the product. This commercial showed how well the Volvo cars were made.

Besides, Berger said that a great commercial had to have a well-written campaign, which means that the content of the commercial had to be awesome.

One student said that none of the professors in City Tech taught him how to make commercial. Being a student, we don't have to wait for professors to give us assignments to do. "Open your closet or refrigerator, pick an object, and do a commercial about it," Berger responded.

I learned a lot from Ron Berger today even though I am not in the advertising module. INTERNSHIP – A DOORWAY TO SUCCESS
